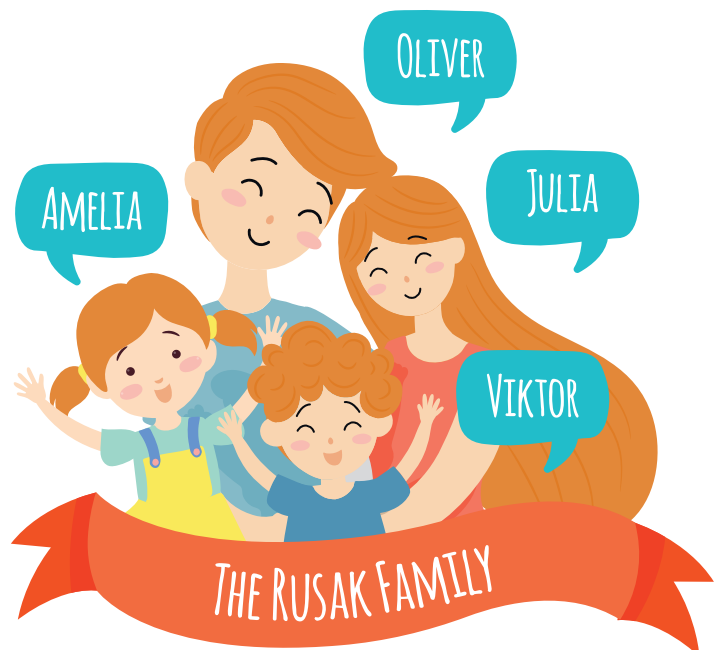

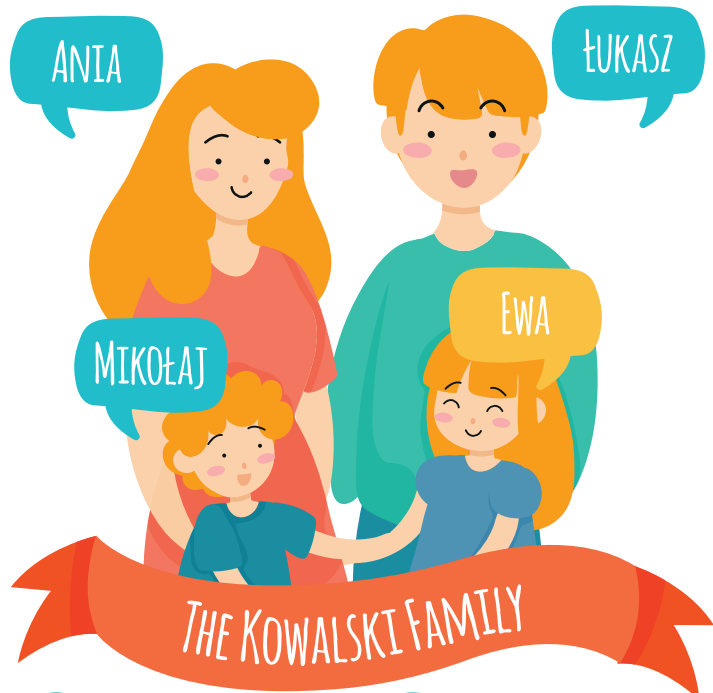

FAMILY STORY
